In der Show treten regelmäßig Autoren, Literaturwissenschaftler und Buchhändler auf, um ihre Werke vorzustellen und über aktuelle Trends in der Romanliteratur zu sprechen. Gibt es eine Möglichkeit, die Show 'Roman' online zu sehen? Ja, die Sendung ist in der ZDF-Mediathek verfügbar. Dort können Zuschauer die Folgen nach der Ausstrahlung kostenlos abrufen. Welche Themen werden in der Show 'Roman' besonders behandelt? Die Show behandelt eine Vielzahl von Themen, darunter neue Romantrends, literarische Klassiker, gesellschaftliche Themen in der Literatur und Interviews mit bekannten Autoren. Wie kann man an der Show 'Roman' teilnehmen oder Feedback geben? Zuschauer können per E-Mail oder auf den Social-Media-Kanälen des Senders Feedback geben oder sich für Zuschauerfragen registrieren, die in der Sendung aufgegriffen werden können.

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
